Wilson County Seen and Heard

What birds have you seen this year in Wilson County? As of today January 12, 2017, 79 different species have been reported in Wilson County for the new year on eBird. 11 Species of waterfowl, 4 hawk species, 2 gull species, 3 owl species, all the woodpecker species, and many passerines, including Rusty Blackbirds and Purple Finches which seem to be everywhere. I had 7 Common Loons today at Shutes Branch Recreation Area along with Bonaparte's and Ring-Billed Gulls, and lots of Pied-billed Grebes. Did not see the Eagles yet in the nest across from Cedar Creek Access Area in Mt. Juliet; any time now they should start nesting. Had a nice flock of Purple Finches and Cedar Waxwings on Hebron Rd. Ducks are showing up on all the little ponds in the area. Get out and find some. Greg had 3 Sandhill Cranes at the fields near Lebanon High School. Good birding.
