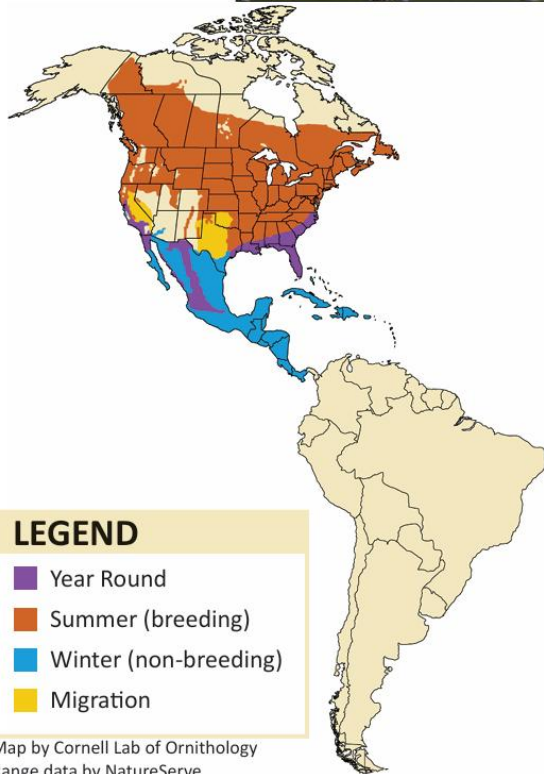
Tips for Finding Warblers Near You

- Find a greater diversity of warblers in layered forest habitats
- Start on forest edges and scan for motion
- Listen for individuals calling and watch for movement
- Focus on one bird at a time...get to know it
- Distinguish warblers by their small size and quick movements
- Discover different migrants during early and late spring

Name in Spanish:

Enmascarado nortño

What do they eat?

Insects and spiders

Where do they breed?

Across much of the US (except the southwest) and Canada

Breeding Habitat

Edges of swamps, marshes, wet thickets, and streams

Where do they winter?

Southeastern US, Mexico, Caribbean Islands (including Cuba, the Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, and the Bahamas), Guatemala, Belize, Honduras, El Salvador, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Panama

Winter Habitat

Marshes, brushy pastures and fields

Problems

Loss of habitat from draining of marshes; collisions with lighted towers and other tall structures during migration

Did you know?

Like other migratory songbirds, they migrate at night and males arrive on the breeding grounds about a week before females do.

An advantage for bird enthusiasts is that many of our migratory species are much easier to spot during migration while resting during the day! So... it is this with Common Yellowthroats!! *With a bit of patience, you might also catch a flock of COMMON YELLOWTHROATS in migration at night, visible against a full moon!*

Common Yellowthroats have a distinctive song that's easy to recognize. **Listen for "witchety-witchety-witchety" repeated up to 300 times an hour!**

SATURDAY SEPTEMBER 26th at 11:49 pm is CDT 's Full MOON! OCTOBER 25th 11:12 pm is CDT's Full Moon!

LBC Challenge- try to find any birds using Moonlight to migrate or just fly to wherever between now and this time next year! Maybe we can have a story to share!!

Record	Bird	Approximate distance
Longest annual migration	Arctic Tern	Up to about 96,000 km
Longest nonstop flight	Bar-tailed Godwit	About 13,500 km
Fast long nonstop flight	Great Snipe	About 6,800 km in 84 hours
Long songbird ocean flight	Blackpoll Warbler	Up to about 3,000 km
Noteworthy tiny-bird crossing	Ruby-throated Hummingbird	Up to about 800 km

[15 Birds With The Longest Migrations You Should Know | Birdserenity](#)

- American Redstart: tail with orange base and black tip (male) or yellow base and dark gray tip (female)
- Black-and-white Warbler: black-and-white “arrow” spotting on the undertail coverts
- Canada Warbler: combination of yellow belly, white vent and undertail coverts, dark gray undertail
- Magnolia Warbler: combination of white vent and undertail coverts, white base of tail, black tail tip
- Palm Warbler: yellow undertail coverts, black tail base, white tail tip (Palms also frequently bop or wag their tails)
- Worm-eating Warbler: beige underneath with dusky smudging on the undertail coverts
- Yellow Warbler: everything is yellow below.
